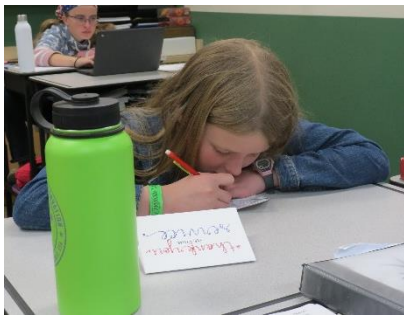
The seventh and eighth grade class went on a field trip, Monday, November 14th. They first went to the
