Johnathan Rand started writing books in March of 2000 and his first book was *St. Helena*, a horror-fiction book. In Michigan, his most popular series is the Michigan Chillers, but in other states, the American Chillers are more popular. Fans of

his work appreciate his heart-racing and well-plotted stories.

For some of you who wonder about the secret symbols on the cover of the Chillers series, they represent the two

lowercase letters, "d" and "h", which are the initials of his book cover illustrator.

Like most authors, Johnathan Rand visits the places he writes about while writing the books. He has been to almost every state except for a few faraway



ones such as Alaska and Hawaii. While traveling, he visits many schools, and speaks about the love of reading and writing, and how it changed his life for the better.
